# Today's Live Chapel Service GOD IS STILL HERE



## **Prayer awareness: Bible Society**

Ever since our founding in 1804, Bible Society has been involved in prisons. Founder William Wilberforce was a vocal campaigner for prison reform, and for decades we've provided Bibles to prisoners in their first language. 2020 marks the first time we've joined the national week of prayer for prisons – and we hope you will be inspired to join in. Prisons Week is a time for Christians to pray for all those connected to prisons: prisoners and their families, victims of crime and their communities, people working in the criminal justice system and the many people involved caring for those affected by crime. It's been going for more than 40 years, and starts on Prisons Sunday, the second Sunday in October.

'People are quite wary of prisons and prisoners,' said Revd Bob Wilson, Chair of Prisons Week. 'It's easy to think of prisoners as "other"... the monsters over the wall. But they are people who sit beside us through life. And it's hard to feel biased against someone if you are committed to praying for them.'

This year, the theme of the week is: You are not alone. As Bob said, 'The word lockdown comes from prison. And we've all experienced that lately. So we're united in lockdown, and united in prayer.'
